Your generous support helps to provide monthly food distributions for his family as well as needed medications and access to other medical necessities and therapies.

For many of the children in the sponsorship program, this assistance is life-saving. Most of the families in the small, rural community of La Mercedes and the surrounding areas are farmers or make handicrafts. Many are not able to provide well for their children's needs

because they need to provide full-time care for their disabled child. Many of the people in this area suffer from skin conditions and parasites. Malnutrition is also a common problem. Only about 50% of the adults can read and write. Government schools have

free tuition but require uniforms and other supplies which put the cost of education beyond many of the people in the area, especially those parents who are also caring for a disabled child.

Disability in Nicaragua

This is Dennis. He has hydrocephalus, which is a common birth defect in Nicaragua, in addition to cerebral palsy. Dennis was not predicted to live past 6 years old. He is 15 and cannot see. He can hear. 15 years as a prisoner in his own body.



RELIGIOUS VIEWS REGARDING DISABILITY

Surveys have found the vast majority of Nicaraguans are Christian with 73% adhering to the Roman Catholic practices. One challenge that people with disability in Nicaragua face is that disability can be equated with sin, making it more difficult to receive assistance from people in one's community.

GOVERNMENT PERCEPTIONS REGARDING DISABILITY

Nicaragua is recognized as the poorest country in Central America

according to an article written by Susan B Matt in Disability Studies Quarterly. This means that children with disabilities in Nicaragua have very few resources. Between 10-15% of the Nicaraguan population are experiencing disability. There are few laws protecting those with disability and many of them are not reinforced.

CULTURAL BELIEFS REGARDING DISABILITY

There appears to be a mixed cultural response to people with disability in Nicaragua, according to Susan B Matt in her study published in Disability Studies Quarterly. While some

people are accepting of those with disability, many people still have a negative view of this portion of the population. People with disability are often ostracized. It is not

Pastor Carlos

The Mercy Ministry began in 2006 when Pastor Carlos discovered 18 children recycling at the garbage dump in his city of Somoto. They were poor, and hungry, barefoot and unschooled. He built them a home, fed and clothed them and sent them to school. He soon learned that some of the kids and some of the staff that was helping, knew of someone with a child with disabilities. Pastor Carlos learned that these 10 homes were also hungry. This number is now 265 children with special needs. Where many of the fathers have fled, leaving hungry and downcast families.

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hopeful that their children will gain independence in the future. Also, some medical treatment, such as physical therapy, is beginning to become available.
